

#### How Can I Raise Awareness for CTE Month?

While national CTE groups such as Advance CTE, ACTE, and Career and Technical Student Organizations will publicize CTE Month, this is also a chance to raise awareness of your own work and engage all of your stakeholders in the CTE conversation, from students to policymakers. The following are some ideas to consider when planning the month's activities:

#### Celebrate!

Recognize those in your community, whether it's high-achieving CTE students, exemplary educators, or impactful partners that have a positive influence in CTE by celebrating their accomplishments through awards programs.

#### **Recognize CTE at the State Level**

Engage policymakers in the conversation by encouraging them to designate February as CTE month.

#### **Involve Your Partners**

The Career Technical Education (CTE) community encompasses all the people that work to make your CTE program – whether it's at the local, state or national level – great, including education, community, and business partners. Encourage them to advocate for CTE to their own networks, and invite partners to participate in celebratory events or site visits.

#### Coordinate

Once you've got all partners on board, it's crucial to coordinate messaging among all who will help to promote CTE during the month. Supply partners with sample social media posts, templates and website copy to be sure all partners are messaging under a common theme.

#### **Engage Employers**

Contact local employers and businesses that aren't yet familiar with your CTE program and invite them to school visits to showcase high-quality CTE in action, or career fairs with already engaged employers. Use Advance CTE fact sheets and talking points designed specifically to address this audience.

#### Get the word out!


- A sizable Professional Trades shortage exists in Michigan and is expected to continue.

# **SCECH** Information

There will be three to seven clock hours available at the conference. To receive seven hours, you must attend all sessions in full. Applications for State Continuing Education Clock Hours will be available at the Conference Registration desk located in the Center Concourse.

If you choose to apply for SCECHs, there are a few important steps involved with obtaining the SCECHs.

- 1. You must attend a minimum of 3 sessions as the Michigan Career Education Conference provides a variable offering of 3-7 SCECHs. If presenters release early, you have not met the time block submitted. Every effort is made to alert the presenter of this. For the Michigan Career Education Conference, this means entering a breakout session on time and staying in the same session for the entire duration of that time period.
- 2. You must have completed the SCECH application with your PIC number, and pay the \$10.00 application fee **prior to the start** of the conference.
- 3. You must have the host sign you out at the conclusion of each session. Lunch sessions are not eligible for SCECHs. There will be a monitor available in each session room to sign your sheet as you depart. The conference has several breakout sessions, and you will be provided a sheet with all session opportunities outlined. It is your responsibility to find the monitor at each session to get your form stamped/initialed when you leave the session you must attend the entire session.
- 4. You will receive an email from MOECS NoReply indicating you have 30 days to complete an evaluation form for the event. If you do not complete the evaluation, you will not be awarded SCECHs, nor will you be refunded the application fee. Do not confuse the evaluation of the conference, with the survey for the SCECHs.
- 5. Once you have completed the evaluation, you will be able to access your unofficial transcript. This will show all SCECHs and previous SB-CEUs that you have been awarded. You can print an official transcript from your MOECS account. Your SCECHs will upload to MOECS. Please visit www.Michigan.gov/teachercert for additional information regarding SCECHs.

### Locating Your PIC Number: K-12 School District Employee PIC

Your PIC can be accessed by logging into your account in the MOECS system at www.Michigan.gov/moecs, and clicking on "Click here to go to the MOECS Login Page". If you have never been in MOECS before, create a MOECS account by following the directions:

- 1. Click on "Login Assistance" in the MOECS log-in box.
- 2. Enter your first and last name and the last 4 digits of your social security number. MOECS will determine you do not have an account and you will be redirected to create one.
- 3. Go back to the MOECS log-in page and log in with your new log-in name and password assigned through MEIS.
- 4. Answer all of the questions through the initial creation pages, and fill in all required fields. Click "Save" once you have completed these steps.
- 5. Your PIC will be pulled into your MOECS account and located on your Manage Demographics page, just below your email. If it does not appear there within three days, please contact the SCECH Administrator at SCECH@Michigan.gov.

If your PIC is not in your MOECS account, and you are not an MDE certified educator or K-12 school district employee, please contact MOECSSupport@Michigan.gov.

# **Excellence in Practice Awards**

### 2018 Career and Technical Education Outstanding Programs

The **Career and Technical Education Outstanding Program Award** recognizes a successful, exemplary, state-approved career and technical education program that demonstrates outstanding outcomes, produces measurable results, and leads to documented success in employment or postsecondary education/training.

### Ann Arbor Public Schools, Ann Arbor Student Building and Industry Program

The Ann Arbor Student Building Industry Program (AASBIP) is recognized for the exemplary utilization of their Program Advisory Committee. The committee meets monthly with an average attendance of 18 of the 25 members. In addition, committee members donate numerous hours of their time to the students by demonstrating their skills, serving as classroom speakers, and various sponsorships. The AASBIP students have numerous opportunities to get to know the committee members personally and are regularly found working alongside them; flipping pancakes, demonstrating their skills and abilities, working with them on a "Saturday Build", and interviewing for a job.

Students in the AASBIP work as a team in accomplishing the goal of finishing a home in 9 months. Each semester AASBIP hosts a "Saturday Build." Local contractors, Program Advisory Committee members, and alumni come to the build site and assess the student's skills. They offer suggestions, build with the students, and often students are offered an internship. The 2016-17 home was 3,400 square foot and sold within a week.

Additional activities include the students overseeing build activities for the Showcase Day, which is a one-day event that includes grades 9-11 students from the five sending schools. Students also participate in the Ambassador Program which pairs a student with a special needs student or a student that needs additional help. The AASBIP is the only high school program that is invited to participate in the annual "Just Build It" at Eastern Michigan University. Middle and high school students from area schools attend the day to see the multiple opportunities the building and industry trades have to offer.

### Careerline Tech Center, Public Safety and Security Services Program

The Public Safety and Security Services (PSSS) program at Careerline Tech Center is recognized for its innovative relationships with local business partners and their strong curriculum alignment to local and state standards. Students who complete the PSSS course are prepared for immediate employment as public and private security officers, cadets with local and state police officer programs, the Armed Forces as Military Police, and/or continuation of their education towards a postsecondary degree.

The PSSS is established with the local areas as a program that provides students with a high level of leadership training and a passion for community service. The dynamic leadership team of this course, Mr. Lee Hoeksema and Mr. David Blakely, pride themselves on providing a classroom environment that meets the relational needs of their students while delivering a rigorous curriculum that is current with local trends.

An exemplary feature of this program is the intentional focus on the mental and physical wellness of the students. Depression, anxiety, addiction, anger, heart problems, high blood pressure, and suicide are all potential issues for anyone serving in the protective services field. Throughout this course there is an emphasis on the balance of mental, physical, community, and spiritual health.

In the 2016-2017 school year the Careerline Tech Center PSSS program partnered with 9 unique businesses to provide students with 70 different work-based learning experiences totaling 415 hours. The PSSS is prominently established within the local areas as a program that produces students with leadership training and a passion for community service.

# **Excellence in Practice Awards**

### 2018 College and Career Readiness Award

The **Career and College Readiness Initiative Award** recognizes outstanding practices, programs, or services that demonstrate exemplary support of career/college planning for students (that include their interests, abilities, and skills), promotion of high academic expectations, and linking secondary course taking (including CTE) to prepare for postsecondary education and careers.

### Alpena Public Schools, Alpena Schools Career and College Campaign

We applaud the significant accomplishment of Alpena Public Schools (APS) for their success in the reestablishment of their good standing after having been reported on the deficit school spending list and their secondary buildings declared focus schools.

The APS District promptly established a committee named "Raising the Bar" to study student achievement and student "culture" within the district. The results of the study lead APS to elect the motto "A Culture of *Excellence*". That culture was developed by instituting a district wide MTSS initiative and a concentration on changing culture with a Career and College Readiness campaign for all. APS received a CTE integration grant, and the welding technology, construction technology, and auto tech CTE programs are teaching algebra II standards so student can be competitive within the college and job markets. With an agreement having been established this past May between Alpena Community College and APS, the first cohort of 38 graduated their 13th year. There are currently over 40 in each of the upcoming classes.

Alpena Public Schools has committed to the use of Career Cruising. All APS students, from 7th grade forward, visit the website and complete the lessons for their grade level. In 7th grade, students spend significant time in career exploration activities. During the 8th grade, the career cruising functions as a tool for identifying high school pathways and course scheduling. The district-wide career and college ready initiative is comprehensive and not just geared to the CTE student, but to every student regardless of abilities.

"Out of some very intense discussions, a need for EVERY student to have a career and/or college plan was evident to decrease course failure rates and increase graduation rates. To do this...it took everyone in the district and community to make a conscious effort...for our kids! And we have!"

### Wexford-Missaukee Career Technical Center, The Tentacles of Collaboration

The Wexford-Missaukee Career Technical Center (WMCTC) (a low income and rural area) has successfully collaborated with many different local agencies, organizations, and businesses to provide a successful pathway to removing all barriers for every student. The cornerstone of the initiative was building unique *Relationships* and forming personal *Partnerships*. Local manufacturers and businesses had continuously requested that graduates have exceptional soft skill training. The Center enhanced their curriculum to not only emphasize the technical skill training, but also the importance of soft skills for job retention. Students now develop a career path for a selected occupation, prepare a cover letter and resume, and participate in a mock job interview. All students participate in job shadows, tours, and in some cases work-based learning opportunities.

Students are successful because of one key outcome *Relationships*, which are developed with the local schools, organizations, postsecondary institutions, and businesses. By utilizing these *tentacles* to reach their community partners, WMCTC can address the needs of every individual student, and assist each student in their ability to be successful. The strengthened personal relationships with employers has allowed WMCTC to meet the employment needs for local employers by better preparing students with not only the technical field skills, but excellent soft skills as well. Because local employers are hiring students from WMCTC, these students are able to live locally and are now productive members of the community.

Students are often tested on their skills and Tiana gives timely feedback to ensure they can be successful. This has proved very beneficial as she has above 86% pass rate on the cosmetology state license exam. Tiana worked with her advisory committee to create plans to open a salon right at Genesee Career Institute. Tiana recognized that transportation was a barrier for students. This barrier limited their ability to learn on the job skills that were necessary for employment. Tiana approached local administration to create the salon and it has created a great connection for our students to the community.

### Deirdre (Dede) Ford is the New Teacher of the Year

Dede is a criminal justice instructor at the Calhoun Area Career Center. Being a prosecutor for more than twenty years has allowed Dede to bring a fresh set of eyes and experiences to the education setting. Students have gone to the Michigan State University College of Law, the Calhoun County Justice Center, Michigan State Police (MSP) Aviation Unit, MSP Bomb Squad, Michigan Supreme Court and Michigan Court of Appeals. She clearly sees the merit in exposing students to experiences beyond the classroom.







### First Floor, Lobby Level





## Second Floor, Concourse Level






